5. A Call to the Citizens of Zambia

To all our people, regardless of tribe, region, political party or social standing:

- Reject violence and refuse to be used to harm others.
- Guard your words, especially on social media—*“Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone.” Colossians 4:6(NIV)*
- Exercise your rights peacefully and responsibly.
- Pray for our nation and work for unity in your communities.
- Support one another in times of hardship.

Let us remember that Zambia is bigger than any political party, any election, or any moment of crisis.

We encourage our church members and other faith communities to:

- Intensify prayer for peace, justice and national healing.
- Provide safe spaces for dialogue and reconciliation.
- Support the vulnerable through acts of charity and solidarity.
- Speak truth courageously but lovingly.
